With petitions and applications in hand, they all meet on September 12th, 1957 in the auditorium of the Willis Avenue School in Mineola. This was an "organizational meeting" and it was called to order at 8:30 PM by Mr. John Everetts Jr., who was the Society Director of Region 1. Mr. Everetts went on to speak about the "aims, purposes, benefits and history" of the Society, tracing its growth from the first Chapter in 1906. The Long Island Chapter would become the 70th Chapter to be formed. Mr. Everetts also spoke about the various research projects and their impact on the industry. After Mr. Everetts concluded, the meeting was turned over to the new Chairman, Mr. Henry Campbell Jr. who spoke on the purposes and benefits of forming a local chapter. Mr. Campbell went on to ask for volunteers for the necessary committees; Nominating, Bylaws, Charter Meeting and Membership. After accepting volunteers, Mr. Campbell asked the Steering Committeemen to turn over the petitions and applications to Mr. Fred Hoffman, Assistant to the Executive Secretary of Society for processing at their next admissions and advancement meeting. The meeting was adjourned at 10:45 PM and there were 52 persons in attendance. The petitions were received at Society on October 2nd, 1957 and on October 12th the Charter for the Organization of the "Long Island Chapter of Cont'd. on Page 3

History

Look around at the landscape of Long Island and you will see the history of our chapter members past and present. Buildings of all types, offices, apartments, schools, hospitals, stadiums and the countless manufacturing operations are a tribute to all the HVAC designers and tradesmen who helped build them. Some projects are in the public eye and enjoy notoriety. Others, which may be in the private or government sector often aren't as visible but are every much as important. One such project that took place in the 1980's was the Colliding Beam Accelerator (CBA) that was constructed at Brookhaven National Laboratory.

Some of our chapter members participated in the construction and operation of a very unusual refrigeration system for this new accelerator built at Brookhaven. The magnets, which control the particle beams operate at a temperature of 4K and

need a refrigeration system to cool them. With a lot of design study, the resultant helium refrigeration system became the world's highest capacity refrigerator in the 4K range. The initial CBA would later become the Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider and would see future refrigeration design changes. The initial system would operate at two temperature levels. It produced a refrigeration effect, which was the equivalent of approximately 25 KW at 4K with the designed output as follows:

- 55 KW at 55K for heat shield cooling.
- 13.65 KW at 4K for magnet cooling.
- 100 G/S at 4K (liquefaction) for power leads.

Supercritical helium was pumped around to the loops by a centrifugal compressor and the heat was rejected to sub cooler heat exchangers. The other side of the heat exchangers contained boiling liquid helium.

The technical detail and explanation of this whole system would require far more space than I have to write in. I think most folks however will get the idea that this was not your typical restaurant refrigerator. The collider is not visible from the street and may not be publicly popular but it has made extraordinary contributions to scientific research in particle physics. Putting it into perspective, it's important to remember that the contributions of ASHRAE's members go well beyond the limits of creature comforts.



ASHRAE Release No. 1

ASHRAE Offsets Emissions at Meeting; DuPont Contributes

ATLANTA — ASHRAE's recent 2007 Winter Meeting earned event certification under Leonardo Academy's Cleaner and Greener®/Health and Climate Care Program.

The current emission offsets donated by attendees for the meeting, held Jan. 27-30 in Dallas, have offset more than 120 percent of the carbon dioxide emissions.

ASHRAE invited attendees to make charitable donations to the Cleaner and Greener Program for the purchase of offsets for the meeting. This provides attendees with the opportunity to take personal responsibility for offsetting the emissions caused by their participation in this event.

DuPont Refrigerants also contributed with a donation of 3000 metric tons of carbon dioxide equivalent emission reduction. The donated emission reductions were created in 2003 as the result of HFC-23 emissions reductions at the DuPont Louisville Works Facility in Kentucky.

"ASHRAE thanks DuPont for its support in donating emission offsets equal to 120 percent of the estimated CO2 emissions of the meeting," Terry Townsend, P.E., ASHRAE president, said.
