Our chapter website, www. ashraeli.org, is on the verge of completion. The website committee is tirelessly working with our web designer to finalize the format and then populate the site with the information.


John Nally is working on enriching our Long Island archives with any old ASHRAE

History - "A Little Snow on the Roof"

If you look within our chapter, you will find active members who have acquired years of experience and have used their knowledge to help shape our HVAC community. I did not have to look much further than my own back yard to find this one fellow. Raymond O. Combs, "Ray", has been part of the Long Island ASHRAE community since the early years. Now I won't tell you how old Ray is, but let's just say he predates man-made radiation by some 10 to 15 years. Unfortunately there isn't enough space in this article to list Ray's accomplishments and contributions. But let me give you a quick overview.

In 1951 while attending Hofstra University, Ray found part time work for the Long Island Division of Petroleum Heat & Power, a division of Standard Oil of Indiana. Ray graduated from Hofstra and was still with "PH & P" in 1956 when he received a tap on the shoulder from "Uncle Sam". He served in the Army from 1956 to 1958 specializing in guided missile systems. Stationed at Fort Totten, he worked locally at several of the "Nike" sites. After serving his country Ray went back to "PH & P" briefly and in 1960 changed jobs to the newly formed Petro Division of Iron Fireman. Over the next several years Ray became instrumental to the manufacturers success and gained industry recognition as a leader in his territory, which stretched from Maine to Virginia. Specializing in the design, sales and service of commercial and industrial boilers. burners and related auxiliaries. Ray's future had been molded for the year to come.

Ray joined the Long Island Chapter of ASHRAE in 1961 just three years after its start in 1958. He remembers back to those days, the meetings, the people and the many building projects he shared in. Ray continued on professionally with

Iron Fireman until 1971 when he left and became a partner in the Volkman Corp. Ray continued sharing his expertise in engineered boiler and burner sales and in 1976 he started with his partners. Boiler Room Specialties Corp., a manufacturers representative and heating equipment supply company. Throughout the years he continued with his support of our Chapter and in the late 1970's answered the call to the Board of Governors. Ray was voted on to the Board and progressed through the Chairs and became Chapter President in 1984. "Yep in those days we held the meetings at the University Club at Hofstra" he remembers. Around the same time he was progressing through the chairs, Ray acquired Boiler Room Specialties as the sole owner. As if Ray wasn't busy enough between his business and ASHRAE, he also taught heating classes at Farmingdale University for a number of years. I'll bet there are more than a few people reading this that have attended his classes. After a 20 year run, Ray wound down "BRS" in 1997 and joined Applied Technologies as the Director of Engineering where he remains today.

Ray has been active for more than a half century our industry, designing and selling equipment, and teaching the fundamentals of heating to countless numbers of contractors and consultants. If you think Ray has slowed down in his senior years think again. He is a busy as ever and as I write this article he was at a job site assisting a contractor with commissioning. There may be a little snow on his roof, but the fire inside is still burning strong.

Mold Litigation

Recently "mold" has been the word that sparks fear in the hearts of many in the HVAC industry. Mold litigation has exploded onto the scene in a manner reminiscent to asbestos, which led to thousands of legal claims and expenditures of enormous amounts of resources and many bankruptcies. Increased publicity, legislative interest and litigation and insurance have all been cited as reasons for this upsurge. Luckily, there are actions the HVAC industry can take to protect themselves.

Regardless of the fact that there is still an ongoing debate as to the health risks associated with mold exposure, the media's focus on mold has raised both the public's awareness and concern. Many of these media reports place blame on the owners, designers, engineers, and architects regardless of the circumstances causing this problem. Despite this rise in publicity, defending against a lawsuit often involves challenging plaintiffs' experts and the science purportedly linking mold to health claims.

Mold concerns have generated legislative interest. California has adopted legislation intended to establish acceptable exposure levels and to require disclosure of mold in property transactions. Similarly, US Rep. John Coyers has introduces the "United States Toxic Mold Safety and Protection Act of 2002". This bill would create a mold insurance program, research the associated health risks, establish exposure levels, create guidelines to prevent mold contaminations, certify mold inspectors, and require mold inspections for certain properties.

Insurance companies have seen mold related claims rise over the past several years. Insurance companies have been found liable by juries for not properly responding to the insured's claims for coverage. The insurance companies, in an effort to protect themselves, are responding by trying to challenge coverage under existing policies and attempting to revise new policies so that mold coverage is not available. Design professional, owners, manufacturers and contractors should be aware, as these new policies come into effect and the litigation matures, those who claim injury will look to hold them responsible.

The HVAC industry can take certain steps to both prevent and protect themselves from mold related lawsuits. First and foremost, designers should account for mold in their designs. Ashrae has published a great deal of information on this subject and the latest technologies should be employed in every design. Secondly, practitioners should keep mold liability in their mind when preparing contracts for design and construction. Practitioners should always document all key aspects and should avoid unwittingly agreeing to responsibility in indemnification clauses. Lastly, Practitioners should consider insurance policies to ensure adequate coverage. This may include special policies to cover mold situations if mold claims present a risk to their business.

Low ODP, Global Warming

Refrigerant Researched by ASHRAE Information on a new refrigerant with zero ozone depletion potential and low global warming potential is being gathered through research conducted by the American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air-Conditioning Engineers (ASHRAE).

R-245fa is suitable for low pressure water chillers typically used in large building air conditioning. Equipment also is being developed using R-245fa in other heat transfer and working fluid applications.

ASHRAE approved funding totaling \$986,953 for eight research projects in the areas of indoor air quality, comfort and health, energy conservation, operating and maintenance tools, environmentally safe materials and design tools at its 2003 Annual Meeting held here June 28-July 2.

Among them is 1256-TRP, Thermophysical Properties of R-245fa. The principal investigator is Alexandre Grebenkov, Ph.D., Institute of Power Engineering Problems, Sosny, Minsk, Republic of Belarus. The project is expected to take 10 months to complete at a cost of \$55,500. It is sponsored by ASHRAE Technical Committee 3.1, Refrigerants and Secondary Coolants.

Researchers plan to provide accurate thermodynamic and transport property data. The two primary sources of such data, the National Institute of Standards and Technology and Honeywell, disagree on the properties of R-245fa, making it difficult for machinery manufacturers to decide which data to use, according to Grebenkov.

Other published information differs on the thermal conductivity and viscosity of the saturated liquid and vapor. This information is required by engineers for chiller heat exchanger design.
